Special thanks to Phil Gelsheimer, Ian Comey and Don Harkness for their contributions to the bylaw's amendments.


Also, thanks to the long-range planning committee led by Brian Millar for their good work.



"Next year" will be our mantra for the 2020 challenge.



After a fine meal prepared by Dan and his Social Committee, there will be the inevitable task of cleaning dishes. Some of you might be aware that the appliance in the kitchen long referred to as a sanitizer is in reality a commercial dishwasher. I have been asked questions on how to use this dishwasher and thought it might be helpful to pass along some details since it is not the same as the dishwasher in your home.

To make best use of the dishwasher and avoid clogging the drains in the club, use the following basic approach:

- Open the dishwasher and remove all racks inside and check that the screens on the bottom are clear. If these screens get blocked the dishwasher will over flow.
- 2. Turn the dishwasher on 20 minutes before you expect to use it. This allows the dishwasher to heat the water to clean sufficiently.
- 3. Check the bottles of cleaning fluid on the floor leading to the dishwasher, replace if empty. More is available in the supply room, just ask the bar staff. If replacing an empty bottle, after connecting it, press the 'Prime' button on the dishwasher until you see fluid come out inside the dishwasher on the bottom right side. This is the only time you need to press the Prime button.
- 4. Scrape the plates so all food items go into a garbage pail. This step is **critical** as food and grease dumped down the drain causes blockages.

These blockages are what cause water to back up and flood the bar floor and eventually drain into the women's washroom ceiling; staining and if enough, collapsing the ceiling.

- 5. Place a rack on the sink and load with dishes. Use the overhead sprayer to rinse the dishes thoroughly, focusing on areas missed in the scraping process.
- 6. Load the rack into the dishwasher and press the green button. In 2 minutes, you will have hot and clean dishes.
- For cutlery, I suggest letting it soak in a bin while you clean the dishes, then pour out the bin onto a flat rack. Rinse with the sprayer and now it's ready for the dishwasher.
- 8. For pots and pans, scrape as you did for dishes and then you will need to wash them in the sink. Once done it is a good idea to run them through the dishwasher too.

If you prefer to see how all of this done, this 8-minute training video shows the process:

Note that the video shows a kitchen sink equipped with a food disposal unit (a.k.a. garburator). Since the club's kitchen does not have one of those, good scraping of the dishes is paramount.

For all those cleaning dishes at the club, a big thank you and I hope these tips make it easier for you.

Chicken is Here!

Chicken is here! We have farm raised chicken available in pieces. Frozen and vacuum sealed. Contact us to send a price list and availability. We will be doing a group of full chickens later this summer. Taking orders for pork halves and wholes as well as lamb halves and wholes. Pork half is about three wine boxes and half lamb is about one. They will be ready in the fall and can be custom cut.

Chicken dry rub: you can either put the rub on at home and keep in a zip lock bag or mix it and put it on before grilling (or baking or frying). Mix 1tsp paprika, 1 tsp cumin, 1 tsp onion powder, 1\2 tsp garlic powder, 1\4 black pepper, 1\2 tsp seasoning salt and 1/8 cayenne powder (optional). Brush chicken with olive oil or even just pat on dry. Does enough for two chicken breasts or similar. Adjust spices to your own personal taste.

What is with the Wheel?

Every time I come to the clubhouse; I pass the ship wheel built into the wall at the stairs. I've often wondered about its origin. Did it actually come from a ship or was it just a fine replica from a 1960's equivalent of Urban Barn? Looking closely, it appeared real enough, but there was no dates or manufacturer identified. Only the initials O.M. POE stamped into the brass center. But what did that mean?

It turns out there is some history in that wheel. It appears to have come from one of the largest steamships to plow the Great Lakes in the early 20th century and was named after a US Civil War brigadier general, General Orlando Metcalfe Poe.

The steamship was built in Cleveland and entered service in 1900 with the Bessemer Steamship Company. Its LOA was 490' with a beam of 90' and a depth of 29'. To move this big ship around it used its coal-fired boilers which delivered 2300 HP.

Originally it was built with two stacks situated fore and aft. One stack removed when the vessel was reboilered in 1910. As a bulk freighter it carried goods around the lakes until it was sold in 1954 to Wyandotte Transportation Co. and converted to a barge. It came to an end in 1955 when it was sold for scrap to the Steel Company of Canada in Hamilton.

So that was the ship, but who was General Poe? Orlando Metcalfe Poe was born on the family farm in Navarre, Ohio on March 7, 1832. He attended several public schools and two years in Canton Academy in Canton, Ohio before ultimately attaining his dream – attending the United States Military Academy in West Point,

New York. Poe excelled particularly in mathematics and graduated sixth in his class of 1856. After graduation, Poe sought to put his engineering skills to work for the military. He moved to Detroit to join the Topographical Engineers. Wartime duties for topographical engineers included surveying positions of the army and its enemy, sketching routes of the enemy and preparing maps of battlefields. In peacetime, they surveyed and charted the nation's rivers and lakes.

During the Civil War Poe was known for his bravery, intelligence, and athleticism. Because of his successful command of a number of significant battles, he was selected by General William Sherman to be his chief engineer. Poe oversaw the burning of Atlanta and continued as engineer for Sherman's March to the Sea. After the war, Poe once again served as engineer to General Sherman.

Poe distinguished himself with his lighthouse design on Lake Huron and is responsible for many lighthouses, canals, and locks on the Great Lakes in Michigan. His work on the locks at Sault Ste. Marie opened up the shipping industry in the area and assisted in the creation of the U. S. steel industry. He died October 2, 1895, as a result of multiple broken bones he suffered in a fall while inspecting the Soo Locks in Michigan.

One item I have not been able to connect is how the ship's wheel made it to our club. If any of our members know the story, please share it with me. It's history worth remembering. Phil



Note from the Editor – thanks to our sleuth Phil for tracking down the history of the ship's wheel. Here is a little excerpt from our website https://bhyc.on.ca/about/history/ about how the wheel ended up at the present location of BHYC.

BHYC was founded by several members with a rich naval background and that influence is reflected in the clubhouse today. The ship's helm at the top of the clubhouse staircase came from the Burlington Yacht Club. It had been damaged in a fire and was taken apart, refurbished and put together again by Wally Pollard. The original formation of BHYC came about when select members from the Hamilton Yacht Club, a mixture of Power and Sail, left and formed their own club - Burlington Yacht Club. The site at that time was in the area of Spencer Smith Park, as it is known today. Then, owing to a shortage of space, launching facilities etc., it was moved into an area on the south shore of Hamilton Bay, west of the canal, and a club house was built there. Hughie Ramsay is researching how the wheel ended up at the original club.
